Major General Angela Salinas U.S. Marine Corps (Ret)

Girl Scouts of Southwest Texas (GSSWT) named Major General Angela (Angie) Salinas, U.S. Marine Corps (Ret) as Chief Executive Officer on July 1, 2015.

Salinas served in the U.S. Marine Corps for 39 years. She was the first Latina selected and promoted to the general officer ranks in the U.S. Marine Corps. At the time of her retirement in September 2013, she was the senior ranking woman and Hispanic in the Corps.

A Girl Scout alumna, Salinas is a role model to girls and women seeking to break through the glass ceiling. She was the first woman to command the Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego and the Western Recruiting Region, the first woman assigned as an Assistant Chief of Staff for plans and policy of a major combatant organization and the first woman assigned as a ground major's combat service support monitor. Her personal decorations include the Navy Distinguished Service Medal; the Defense Superior Service Medal; the Legion of Merit with gold star; the Meritorious Service Medal with two gold stars; the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal; the Army Commendation Medal and the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal with two gold stars.

Salinas' accolades extend past her military experience. She is a 2018 San Antonio Chamber of Commerce Tribute to Women Business Leaders Hope Award, 2018 San Antonio Business Journal Women's Leadership Award, and 2018 American Latino Influencer Valor Award recipient. In 2016 she was inducted into the San Antonio Women's Hall of Fame, Hispanic Women in Leadership Hall of Fame and received the TAMACC Woman of Distinction and Hope Hispanic Heritage award. She was named an inaugural Top Latino Leader by the National Diversity Council and was awarded the U.S. Hispanic Leadership Institute's Lifetime Achievement Award; the Hispanic Heritage of Texas Estrellas de Texas; Lifetime Achievement awards from Latina Style Magazine and North Star; the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Leadership Award; Women's International Center's Living Legacy Award; as well as being named one of 15 Phenomenal Women by Latina Magazine and one of six Power Latinas by Vivala.com.

Salinas serves on the Board of Directors for the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, The First Tee of Greater San Antonio, Prospera Housing Community Services and the Young Marines National Board. She is a graduate of Masters Leadership Program San Antonio, a member of Excel Beyond the Bell and the Nonprofit Council and she serves on the San Antonio Airport System Development Committee. A native of Alice, Texas, she holds a Master of Arts from the Naval War College and a Bachelor's degree from the Dominican College of San Rafael, California. She was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Laws from Dominican University in 2015 and named a Distinguished Alumni in 2016.

Major General Linda Urrutia-Varhall (Ret) U.S. Air Force

Award-winning United States Air Force Major General with a 30+ year career as an integral contributor to national security, cyber security, geospatial, and diplomacy initiatives. Recognized as a change agent, diversity champion, and motivational leader, she cultivated collaborative, strategic, global partnerships and galvanized disparate groups to embrace emerging technologies and innovative solutions to address a myriad of strategic and operational challenges, issues, and problems.

She influenced policy, diplomacy, and operations domestically and internationally in various positions throughout the U.S., including the Pentagon; Europe; and Asia. As a subject matter expert and trusted advisor, Linda provided support to Cabinet-level officials, Congressional staff and members, intelligence community leaders, and the office of the President of the United States.

In her last role with the USAF, she served as the Director of Operations of the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency, leading a 7,500-person organization with a \$1.2B budget. As a team under her leadership they established and implemented priorities and strategies focused on geospatial expansion, including satellites, commercial, open source, and airborne imagery information for cutting-edge safety and navigation.

As the right hand to three Secretary of Defense(s) and a Director of National Intelligence, she advised the White House, CIA, and State Department to align objectives, develop strategic plans, execute policy, maximize resources, achieve overarching goals and resolve national security issues.

A passionate mentor and diversity champion, as the first Latina USAFA graduate and Air Force officer to achieve Major General rank, she embraces diversity and fosters professional growth and success of junior staff.

Major General Urrutia-Varhall (ret) currently serves on the United States Strategic Command Strategic Advisory Group (intelligence panel) and is an adjunct research staff member for the Institute for Defense Analyses. Giving back to her alma mater she is a Trustee on the United States Air Force Academy Falcon Foundation. She has a Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering from the USAF Academy in 1984, followed by a Master of Science in Strategic Intelligence with a distinguished graduate designation from the Defense Intelligence College. Additionally, she completed a National Defense Fellowship with Georgetown University, and the Air Force Enterprise Leadership Seminar from The University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill. She was honored to be awarded the Latina Style Lifetime achievement award in September 2019.

Brigadier General Irene M. Zoppi U.S. Army Reserve (Ret)

From humble beginnings, the second of five siblings, BG Zoppi was born and raised in Canóvanas, Puerto Rico. Her military career started on 11 December 1985 when she enlisted as a Private First Class (E3), Military Police Corps. In 1988, she received her commission as a Second Lieutenant, Military Intelligence, after graduating from the University of Puerto Rico, Rio Piedras Campus, as a Distinguished Military Student and Graduate. As a native Spanish-speaker, she was selected and graduated from the renowned Defense Language Institute (DLI), English Language Military Program, English as a Second Language Speakers (ESL), which prepared her for success.

BG Zoppi is a graduate of numerous prestigious military institutions: the U.S. Army War College, Advanced Joint Professional Military Education, the Command and General Staff College, the Combined Arms Service Staff School, and Airborne School. Hereto, she is also branched qualified in Military Intelligence, Civil Affairs, Public Affairs, and Military Police. She holds a Doctorate in Philosophy from the University of Maryland, a Master of Strategic Studies Degree from the U.S. Army War College, a Master of Business Administration, and a Master of Science in Business, Marketing from Johns Hopkins University. BG Zoppi received a Women's Leadership Certificate from Harvard Business School. She also holds a Bachelor of Arts in Modern Languages: Spanish, Italian, French, and German from the University of Puerto Rico.

Currently serving as a volunteer as a Member of Directors and Advisory Board in the Prestigious Blue Star Families, Washington, DC, and Member of Board of Trustees, Anne Arundel Community College, Arnold, MD. Formally, Dr. Zoppi was nominated by the Governor of Maryland and appointed by Maryland State Senate to: (1) Maryland State Board of Education, Ethic Committee, Baltimore, MD; (2) Maryland Board of Trustees, Education of the State of Maryland; and (3) Co-Chair and Commissioner for the State of Maryland on the Commission on the Establishment of Maryland's Women in the Military Service Monument and (4) Member of Maryland Workforce Corporation Board, Annapolis, MD.

Her civilian awards, certifications, and decorations include the Latina of the Year, Latina Style Inc (2020), Latina of Influence Award by the Hispanic Lifestyle (2015); Faculty of Excellence Award, Strayer University, 120th Commencement, Baltimore, Maryland (2012); Maryland's Top 100 Women (2009), Kentucky Colonel, Honorable Order of Kentucky Colonels (2000). In military heritage, BG Zoppi is a member of the American Revolution's Daughters, #845972, with ancestry to former President Abraham Lincoln.

BG Zoppi is married to Sergeant Thomas J. Zoppi, who serves as a Law Enforcement Officer at, County Police. They have four fully-grown offspring with four grandchildren. Her mantra is simple: "Culture is the heart of an organization. Without a heart, there is no pulse. Therefore, take care of PEOPLE, and MISSION will be innovatively VICTORIOUS."

Major General Juan G. Ayala U.S. Marine Corps (Ret)

Mr. Ayala retired as a Major General in the United States Marine Corps after 36 years of service. He has a proven record of success leading large, complex organizations. He is currently the Director, Office of Military and Veteran Affairs for the City of San Antonio. In this capacity, he serves as the City's liaison to the military supporting the Mayor, City Council and city departments. He works closely with military and civilian partners to ensure military missions and installations continue to thrive and grow in the region. In addition, he was assigned as an Executive Temporary Loan to the San Antonio Hispanic Chamber of Commerce from March to August 2020 where he concurrently served as the Chamber's Interim President and CEO. Concurrently, he is serving as the City of San Antonio's Operations Lead for the COVID – 19 Response.

Prior to his retirement, Major General Ayala commanded all 24 Marine Corps installations worldwide and was selected to lead the Department of Defense's 2015 Warrior Games assisting the nation's wounded, ill and injured warriors in their recuperative efforts. He is the former Inspector General of the Marine Corps, and his service includes 4 combat tours in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, to include a year as the Senior Advisor of a Military Transition Team, embedded with the 1st Iraqi Army Division.

Past assignments include: Coordinated humanitarian assistance programs in 50 countries throughout Africa, Eastern Europe, the Balkans, the Baltic's, and the former Soviet Union, served as the Chief of Staff at United States Southern Command leading a staff in the implementation of U.S. national security objectives in 31 countries throughout the Western Hemisphere, to include coordinating detainee operations in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, led a Marine Logistics Group that supported combat operations throughout Iraq, supported humanitarian relief operations after the Haiti Earthquake of 2010, supported Haitian/Cuban refugee operations in Cuba, and coordinated civilian law enforcement counterdrug efforts along the U.S. Southwest Border.

A native of El Paso, Texas, Major General Ayala's military awards include the Distinguished Service Medal, Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit with "V" Combat Distinguishing Device, the Bronze Star Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal (4 stars), and the Combat Action Ribbon. He is the recipient of the 2007 Excellence in Military Service Award from the League of Latin American Citizens (LULAC).

Mr. Ayala currently serves on the Governor of Texas' Advisory Council on Cultural Affairs and is a board member of Visit San Antonio and the National Veterans Outreach (GI Forum). He is the President of the Texas Mayors of Military Communities representing the 16 communities that host military installations in the state of Texas. Since 2016 he has taught Leadership and Ethics as a Visiting Instructor at the Walter Reed National Medical Center in Bethesda, Maryland.

An avid cyclist, hiker and reader, Mr. Ayala is married to the former Diane K. Reyes of El Paso, Texas. They have 3 daughters, a son, and 3 grandchildren.

Col. Andres "Naz" Nazario is the Military Assistant to the Deputy Under-Secretary of Defense for Intelligence & Security. Born and raised in Puerto Rico, Colonel Nazario's military career began in the U.S. Army, where he served both in active duty and National Guard until 1995. He received his Air Force commission as a graduate of the University of South Florida Air Force ROTC program where he specialized in Latin American studies. Colonel Nazario is a designated Foreign Area Officer fluent in Spanish and Portuguese.

Prior to his current post, Colonel Nazario served as Commander of the 17th Training Wing Goodfellow Air Force Base, a Joint Center of Excellence, and the home for the Department of Defense Fire Academy and multi-service intelligence technical training. The wing is responsible for training more than 14,000 firefighting and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance warriors annually for the United States Air Force, Army, Navy, Marine Corps, other government agencies and allied nations. In addition to Goodfellow, Colonel Nazario had responsibility for three geographically-separated units in California, Arizona and Florida. He manages real property, equipment, supplies and contracts in excess of \$1.5 billion and has an annual operating budget exceeding \$288 million.

He has served in a variety of tactical, operational, strategic and leadership positions to include flying squadron, joint Human Intelligence collections, counterterrorism operations, ISR-collection manager, Wing and Air Staff Executive Officer, Director of Intelligence, and Global Exploitation Intelligence Group Command. His deployment experience includes South West Asia, Afghanistan, and extensive travel throughout South America supporting interagency counterterrorism operations and special operations forces.

The Honorable Carlos del Toro, Secretary of the Navy

The Honorable Carlos Del Toro was sworn in as the 78th Secretary of the Navy August 9, 2021. As Secretary, he is responsible for over 900,000 Sailors, Marines, reservists, and civilian personnel and an annual budget exceeding \$210 Billion. His priorities include securing the training and equipment successful naval operations demand and addressing the most pressing challenges confronting the US Navy and Marine Corps — China's naval ambitions, climate instability, Covid's ongoing impact, and strengthening a naval culture of inclusiveness and respect.

Born in Havana, Cuba, Del Toro immigrated to the U.S. with his family as refugees in 1962. Raised in the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood of New York City, he attended public schools and received an appointment to the United States Naval Academy, where he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Electrical Engineering. Secretary Del Toro was commissioned as a Surface Warfare Officer upon his graduation in 1983.

His 22-year naval career included a series of critical appointments and numerous tours of duty at sea — including First Commanding Officer of the guided missile destroyer USS Bulkeley (DDG 84); Senior Executive Assistant to the Director for Program Analysis and Evaluation in the Office of the Secretary of Defense; and Special Assistant to the Director and Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget — where he helped manage the budgets of DOD, the U.S. Department of State, the Central Intelligence Agency, the Defense Intelligence Agency, the National Reconnaissance Office, and the Peace Corps.

After retiring at the rank of Commander, Secretary Del Toro founded SBG Technology Solutions, Inc. in 2004. As its CEO and President, he supported defense programs across a host of immediate and long-term Department of Navy issue areas, including shipbuilding, AI, cybersecurity, acquisition programs, space systems, health, and training.

He holds a Masters in National Security Studies from the Naval War College, a Masters in Space Systems Engineering from the Naval Postgraduate School, and a Masters in Legislative Affairs from George Washington University.

Secretary Del Toro and his wife have four children and a granddaughter.

Capt. Roy Love was born in the Dominican Republic and moved to the U.S. in 1983. In 1988 he graduated from Townsend Harris HS in N.Y. In 1993, he graduated from the State University of New York (SUNY) Maritime College, earning a bachelor's degree in Marine Transportation/Business Administration, and received his naval commission via ROTC.

His sea duty assignments are numerous, having served over 12 years at sea. He attended the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island, earning a Master of Arts Degree in National Security and Strategic Studies in 2008. CAPT Love reported as Commanding Officer of USS BOONE (FFG 28) in June 2010, where he led the ship in winning the Battle Efficiency award in 2011. CAPT Love served in the Joint Staff, Joint Chiefs of Staff, as Joint Division Chief for PACOM, NORTHCOM, and SOUTHCOM, under the Deputy Director for Regional Operations (J35) from 2014-2016. In August 2016, he assumed command of Naval Base San Diego (NBSD), the second-largest Naval Base in the U.S. CAPT Love culminated his tour as Commanding Officer of NBSD in July 2019, after leading the base in winning the Commander in Chief Installation Excellence Award.

His final assignment in the U.S. Navy was as Executive Assistant to Commander Navy Installations Command, who leads 10 Navy Regions and 70 Naval Installations worldwide, with over 50,000 employees and over \$200 Billion in assets, and a \$10B annual operating budget. Captain Love retired from the U.S. Navy in August 2021, after 29 years on active duty. He is currently serving as President of the Association of Naval Services Officers (ANSO) and is the Founder and CEO of The Road Eagle LLC (www.theroadeaglecom) the first Bi-Lingual online Motorcycle Touring Magazine and Blog, made by Latinos, for Latinos and friends. CAPT Love's awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal, Navy Commendation Medal, the Army Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal, the Humanitarian Service Medal, and various U.S. Navy and U.S. Coast Guard unit and service awards.

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
