Senior Master Sergeant Christian Johnson serves as the Superintendent to the Chief of Staff of Air Force (CSAF), the Pentagon, Washington, District of Columbia. As the Superintendent, Sergeant Johnson leads a team of 25 members on the CSAF personal staff and serves as the Senior Enlisted Leader for 11 enlisted members across six Air Force Specialty Codes. She plans, directs, organizes and manages all administrative functions for the Office of the CSAF. She articulates Chief of Staff of the Air Force priorities and decisions critical in execution of all Air Force strategic activities supporting Department of Defense (DDD) and allies. Additionally, Sergeant Johnson also serves as engagements liaison; interfaces with senior civilian and military members of the Secretariat, Air Staff, Joint Staff, Major Commands, Office of the Secretary of Defense, Congress, and the White House on all administrative and official engagements items for the Chief of Staff of the Air Force.

Sergeant Johnson was born in Reynosa, Mexico and grew up in Brownsville, Texas prior to entering the Air Force in 2001. She has worked in multiple facets of her career field at the Squadron, Group, Air Operations Center, Numbered Air Force and Headquarters level. In 2015, she was Development Special Duty vectored to be a Military Training Instructor. She was also selected as the Section Chief of the Basic Military Training Reception Center, where she directed weekly BMT graduation operations and was responsible for receiving, processing and transporting 32,000 AF recruits annually. Throughout her career, she has participated in several exercises as well as deployments in direct support of Operations IRAQI FREEDOM, ENDURING FREEDOM, and Combined Joint Task Force Horn of Africa. Prior to her current assignment, Sergeant Johnson was the Superintendent of Executive Services for the Office of The Inspector General at the Pentagon.

Capt. Roy Love, USN (ret), was born in the Dominican Republic and moved to the U.S. in 1983. In 1993, he graduated from the State University of New York (SUNY) Maritime College with a B.S. in Marine Transportation. He currently serves as President of the Association of Naval Services Officers (ANSO). ANSO conducts recruitment and outreach within America's underserved communities, directly supports Hispanic/Latino(a) members in their decision to remain in their respective services and provides mentoring and professional development.

He attended the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island, earning a Master of Arts Degree in National Security and Strategic Studies in 2008. He deployed to Iraq during Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2009 in support of the ARMY 304th Sustainment Brigade, managing and distributing fuel across all of Iraq to support U.S. and allied forces. He Commanded the Fast Frigate USS BOONE in June 2010 and led the ship in winning the Battle Efficiency award. CAPT Love is the first Dominican and Afro Latino to command a U.S. Naval Warship.

He completed his tour on BOONE in December 2011 and assumed Command of Afloat Training Group Mayport in Jacksonville, in charge of training all Naval vessels in Southeast U.S.He Commanded Naval Base San Diego (NBSD), the second-largest Naval Base in the U.S., and is the first Hispanic/Afro Latino to lead the installation. He led the base in winning the Commander in Chief Installation Excellence Award in 2019.

He is a certified Resilience Building Leadership Professional (RBLP) Trainer and an Authorized Training Partner, dedicated to helping organizations create senior leaders that can build resilient teams, facilitate team learning, and support organizational learning. He currently serves on the Board of Directors, and as a role model, and mentor for Hispanics Inspiring Student Performance and Achievement (HISPA). He also serves on the Board of Directors for DoD Reads, and on the Board of Advisors for American Latino Veterans Association (ALVA).

Founder and CEO of The Road Eagle LLC, he is a certified Motorcycle Safety Foundation Rider Coach and Motorcycle Safety Instructor and an Iron Butt Association (The World's Toughest Motorcycle Riders) long-distance and endurance motorcyclist. Founder and partner of Two Eagle's Leadership LLC. A veteran-owned, minority-owned professional development and leadership growth consulting company. A lifelong learner, he is currently a Doctorate student at the University of Southern Mississippi, pursuing a Ph.D. in Human Capital Development.

He graduated from the Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training Program in 2000. Upon graduation, he was selected to the Marine Enlisted Commissioning Education Program. LtCol Montalvan attended Florida State University, as part of the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps, where he obtained his Bachelor of Science in Criminology. LtCol Montalvan was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in 2002.

As a company grade officer, LtCol Montalvan served as the Motor Transport and Assistant Logistics Officer for 3rd Battalion, 2nd Marines where he deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. He subsequently served as the Executive and Operations Officer for Recruiting Station Albuquerque, NM. His follow-on assignments included Assistant Logistics Officer for the 11th Marine Expeditionary Unit where he deployed in support of Western Pacific 11-2 and Support Branch Officer-In-Charge for I Special Operations Training Group; later renamed to I Expeditionary Operations Training Group.

As a field grade officer, LtCol Montalvan served as the Expeditionary Branch Officer-In-Charge at Marine Corps Logistics Operations Group. He then completed his Joint tour at Joint Functional Component Command for Integrated Missile Defense, United States Strategic Command; where he served as an Integrated Missile Defense Watch Commander and later as the Global Ballistic Missile Defense Training, Education, and Exercise Director. Upon completion of his Jointed tour, LtCol Montalvan served as the 6th Marine Corps District Recruiting Operations Officer. Currently, LtCol Montalvan is a student at the National War College.

LtCol Montalvan is a graduate of the Expeditionary Warfare School and the Marine Corps Command and Staff Non- Resident program. Mr. Castro was born in El Sauce, Nicaragua and migrated to Miami, Florida when he was ten years old. He serves as a board member of the American Latino Veterans Association ALVA, the Latino Student Fund and the Cisneros Hispanic Leadership Institute at George Washington University. Admiral Linda L. Fagan Commandant of the United States Coast Guard

Admiral Linda L. Fagan assumed the duties as the 27th Commandant of the United States Coast Guard on June 1st, 2022. As Commandant, she oversees all global Coast Guard operations and 42,000 active-duty, 7,000 reserve, and 8,700 civilian personnel, as well as the support of 21,000 Coast Guard Auxiliary volunteers.

She previously served as the 32nd Vice Commandant. Prior flag assignments include Commander, Pacific Area, and Commander, Coast Guard Defense Force West; Deputy Commandant for Operations, Policy, and Capability; Commander, First Coast Guard District; and a joint assignment as Deputy Director of Operations for Headquarters, United States Northern Command.

Admiral Fagan has served on all seven continents, from the snows of Ross

Island, Antarctica to the heart of Africa, from Tokyo to Geneva, and in many ports along the way. Robert J. Bianchi, Rear Admiral, Supply Corps, U.S. Navy (Ret) Chief Executive Officer, NEXCOM

Robert J. Bianchi, Rear Admiral, Supply Corps, U.S. Navy (Ret.) is the Chief Executive Officer for the Navy Exchange Service Command (NEXCOM). In this position, he provides leadership and management oversight for the \$3 billion annual worldwide operations of Navy Exchanges, Navy Lodges, Navy Gateway Inns & Suites, Ship Stores Program, Navy Uniform Program Management Office, Navy Clothing and Textile Research Facility and Telecommunication Program Office. In addition, Bianchi also currently serves as Special Assistant to the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Manpower & Reserve Affairs) for Military Resale Transformation.

From November 2017 to September 2020, while still retaining his position as NEXCOM CEO, Bianchi concurrently served as the Defense Commissary Agency (DeCA) Interim Director/Special Assistant for Commissary Operations to the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Manpower & Reserve Affairs). In this role, he exercised oversight authority and responsibility for the day-to-day management and control of 15,000 people
